
Life is what you make it and children are representatives of their environment. How about a little harmony? Sound good? Get creative! Get balanced!



(If you want a list of things to ask your contractor call my office and we will supply you with a free list).

• Go online and purchase a low level carbon monoxide monitor : this is not like the ones you see in stores. RE-**SEARCH – FIND OUT** WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW AND WHY.

Who do you say he is?





From Our Kitchen 4 Layer Pumpkin Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pkg. (2-layer size) yellow cake mix
- 1 can (15 oz) pumpkin, divided
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/3 cup oil
- 4 eggs
 - 1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice, divided
- 1 pkg (8 oz) philadelphia cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 tub (8oz) cool whip, thawed
- 1/4 cup caramel ice cream topping
- ¹/₄ cup chopped pecans

COOKING INSTRUCTIONS

Heat oven to 350 degrees

Beat cake mix, 1 cup pumpkin, milk, oil, eggs and 1 tsp. spice in large bowl with mixer until well blended. Pour into 2 greased and floured 9 inch round pans. Bake 29 to 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans for 10 minutes. Remove from pans to wire racks and cool completely.

Beat cream cheese in medium bowl with mixer until creamy. Add sugar, remaining pumpkin and spice and mix well. Gently stir in the cool whip. Cut each cake layer horizontally in half with a serrated knife. Stake the cakes on a serving plate making sure to spread ample cream cheese between the layers. Do not frost the top layer. Drizzle the top of the cake with the caramel topping just before serving and top off with the pecans. Refrigerate any leftovers.



Maintain your equipment to prevent future problems and unwanted costs. Keep your cooling and heating system at peak per-



Twice a year we find ourselves biting our lower lip and wondering if our heating or air conditioning is performing at its most efficient capability. All of us dread getting our first utility bill when we turn on our system for the first time of the season.

The guys asked me to speak on filters this month so I took a look around to see what we had on hand to help you to know just what it is you should be aware of.

Before I came on the scene here 4 years ago I had no idea what to do with my furnace or a/c or even that it ever needed maintenance except for changing my filters once in a while. I have learned so much since I've been here and would like to share some of what I've learned with you. The following is a pretty basic maintenance checklist, however, if you stick to it you will definitely insure that your equipment is doing its utmost to deliver the comfort you desire in the most efficient way possible. Keep in mind that you need to take added measures with the rest of your home to prevent drafts so that your equipment is not trying to heat or cool the great outdoors as well.

Maintenance Checklist



formance by having a contractor do annual pre-season check-ups. Contractors get busy once summer and winter come, so it's best to check the cooling system in the spring and the heating system in the fall. To remember, you might plan the check-ups around the time changes in the spring and fall.

A typical maintenance check-up by a contractor should include the following:

• Check thermostat settings to ensure the cooling and heating system keeps you comfortable when you are home and saves energy while you are away.

• Tighten all electrical connections and measure voltage and current on motors. Faulty electrical connections can cause unsafe

operation of your system and reduce the life of major components.

• Lubricate all moving parts. Parts that lack lubrication cause friction in motors and increases the amount of electricity you use.

• Check and inspect the condensate drain in your central air conditioner, furnace and/or heat pump (when in cooling mode). A plugged drain can cause water damage in the house and affect indoor humidity levels.

• Check controls of the system to ensure proper and safe operation. Check the starting cycle of the equipment to assure the system starts, operates, and shuts off properly.

(Cooling Specific)

• Clean evaporator and condenser air conditioning coils. Dirty coils reduce the system's ability to cool your home and cause the system to run longer, increasing energy costs and reducing the life of the equipment.

• Check your central air conditioner's refrigerant level and adjust if necessary. Too much or too little refrig-

greater comfort levels. Airflow problems can reduce your system's efficiency by up to 15 percent.

(Heating Specific)

• Check all gas (or oil) connections, gas pressure, burner combustion and heat exchanger. Improperly operating gas (or oil) connections are a fire hazard and can contribute to health problems. A dirty burner or cracked heat exchanger causes improper burner operation. Either can cause the equipment to operate less safely and efficiently.

Actions For You to Do Yourself

• Inspect, clean, or change air filters once a month in your central air conditioner, furnace, and/or heat pump. Your contractor can show you how to do



erant will make your system less efficient increasing energy costs and reducing the life of the equipment.

• Clean and adjust blower components to provide proper system airflow for this. A dirty filter can increase energy costs and damage your equipment, leading to early failure.

What was once clothing to the tree during the sun's most scorching months is now a ton of fun for young and old alike. Once the playing in the leaves has been exhausted it's time to round them up and put them in nice tidy piles near the street and then retire to a nice campfire and those afore mentioned goodies that await. Yes, I love fall for it soothes my soul and heals my heart.

ered him a dangerous young man, even though he had never been violent with them. The less traditional folks just shook their heads in wonder at the young man.

His love for people was already legendary and his rapport with people seemed as natural as breathing, whether he was eating with the powers that be or the people they exercised their power to subdue and control. People were challenged by him, turned around by him, laughed with him, and loved him right back for all of it. They came to him in daytime and nighttime and asked questions or asked for a blessing, but rarely knew quite what to do with him even after they

found him. Eventually some of them hated him.

Towns like Middlebury and suburbs like Merrillville and even cities like Chicago stirred every time he walked through town. People who liked him and people who hated him all seemed drawn to this young man. The one thing it was hardest to do with him was to ignore him. And eventually, the people who had come to hate him, decided to kill him. The crowds who had so recently adored him, joined now in calling for the death penalty. Only his closest friends seemed to decline to call for his death, but even they abandoned him when the authorities came to arrest him.

Trouble, it seemed, had found him once again, and this time without a way of escape.

Funny thing about that boy who grew into such a controversial young man was that when they killed him, he would not stay dead. The third morning after they laid him in a borrowed tomb and sealed it with a government seal and put a 24-hour guard around it to be sure nobody could steal the body, he was gone from the tomb. The women who went to embalm his body in burial spices found the tomb empty and the guards gone, too. They thought the guards took the body. And when they told his friends, they too wondered who had taken the body.

Nobody was ready for it when he walked through the locked door and stood among the friends who had abandoned him. Nobody was ready for it again a few nights later when he came back to see the one who had been absent the first time. He showed them all the marks on his body from when they had beaten him and killed him. He even showed them where he had been stabbed in the heart after he died. But he was alive again and he ate with them and he even cooked them breakfast one day when they had been fishing all night.

What do you a call a young man like that? What do you make of his teaching that you have to die to live and you

have to serve to lead? We can call him by his name, Jesus, but what do we do with him?

I follow him. It is all he has asked any of us to do. He has promised to lead us to a home with God and to give us a place at God's banquet table and I trust him with my life. How about you?
