

I'm finding in this journey that, more often than not, I feel good about myself. Nagging thoughts, frustrating temptations, a nasty little voice reminding me of who I used to be and the things I used to do and the people I once hurt. But lately it's been alleviated to the point where I can think to myself, "You know what? I'm somebody completely different than who I used to be, and I don't have to focus on that anymore because I'm focusing on something that's going to continue making me different from here on out". I fail - yes, miserably sometimes. I still hurt people, including myself and those I love the most, from time to time. I make mistakes, I have fear and anxiety, I'm nowhere near perfect.

Remember being a child, attempting something new for the first time and failing miserably? It wasn't until I was eight years old that I started to learn how to ride a bike. Fear of failure held me back. Then, when I did attempt, MISERABLE failure made me feel like I was stupid. I rode a bike up a tree. We all know that what goes up, must come down. Picture it in a circle... curve up the tree, flip over backwards, fall on back on ground with bicycle on top. My mom, knowing I was all right, just a little bruised pride, hid her smile at my clumsiness and helped me to my feet, wiped my tears, and assisted me while I tried again.

Isn't that what God does?

Every day, I make mistakes, but I'm trying to live in the flow of that exhilarating Spirit. Sometimes I dip my toe in, and, on rare occasions, I throw caution to the wind and hurl myself, full-throttle, limbs akimbo, at the surface of the water, longing with every fiber of my being to FEEL something. Sometimes I miss the water completely and lay, pride bruised, on the bank of the river, tears streaming down my face.

But there's God, hiding his smile and wiping the tears, helping me to my feet so I can try again.

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CLUB SODA – cleans your stainless steel and gives it a great shine.


OLD WHITE SOCKS – are wonderful for dusting furniture – simply discard when finished!

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Grom Our Kitchen

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INGREDIENTS

- 2 pounds lean ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed tomato soup
- 1/4 cup ketchup

- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 8 hamburger buns

- 1. Place ground beef in a large skillet over medium heat. Cook until evenly browned, stirring to crumble. I like to use a potato masher to even out the lumps. Add onion and celery, cover the pan, and cook until tender and transparent, about 5 minutes. Drain off any grease.
- 2. Stir the tomato soup (undiluted), ketchup, vinegar, brown sugar and Worcestershire sauce into the beef mixture. Season with salt and garlic powder. Heat to a simmer over low heat, and cook until thoroughly heated, stirring frequently to prevent it from burning on the bottom.
- 3. Spoon the hot beef mixture onto buns, which may be toasted first, and serve.

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AT WALDEN

The woods are washed out, a water color painting with few bright colors. Flowering Dogwoods bloom and sway like a gathering of butterflies. Violets, close to the ground, are easy to overlook if not for the brief splash of vibrant purple. An errant tulip stands guard near the ruins of the old homestead, scarlet and magnificent. This is Walden Place and it's good to be back.

Walden (not the famous Massachusetts Walden) is made up of two ponds, a small meadow, and a forest. This beautiful place was originally owned by Charles Webb, a retired school teacher, who brought children here to visit, study, and learn a deeper appreciation for nature. His notes are still in the drawers of the little camper snuggled under a wild cherry tree. Mr. Webb was an avid birdwatcher. He wrote about Herons hunting for breakfast and noted the arrival of wood ducks and Canadian geese. He also kept track of flowers and good mushrooming spots. Plat maps detailed the trees and flowers he planted. Early morning found him loading his old Station wagon with water-filled milk jugs and visiting his garden at Walden. At key spots along the ponds, limber fishing poles stood ready at a moment's notice to flick a fly out and catch a sunfish for his supper.

Mr. Webb is gone now, but the

beauty of Walden is eternal. Rabbits bound, deer meander, and squirrels chase each other, quarreling through the trees. Last year a female turkey took up residence. "Henrietta" we call her. She is a nosy, young thing. She never gets too close, but we see her watching us from the bushes and racing down the trails.

Winter was hard on Walden, a lot of downed trees. Brad will soon be busy We will stack with his chainsaw. the wood near the fire pit for campfires and we'll spend hours trimming back the Rose of Sharon that grow everywhere, smell heavenly and grab fiercely. The huge old willow near the pond will fill in and her long, slender limbs will sway, tickling the water.

Best of all, friends will come. On the nights of the full moon, we'll wander along the forest trails. Moonbeams will light our path and we'll stalk, single-file and silent, like the Indians that once roamed this same land, always hoping we don't startle a skunk! But, that's later in the year.

Today, a carpet of last year's leaves crunch under foot. Near the pond, black mud squelches up along the sides of my sneakers. Birds twitter and sing. A Mockingbird performs an early afternoon concert with a litany of stolen birdsongs. Gentle sunlight caresses my face, so warm after winter's frigid touch. Spring is here. I finally believe it. What a wonder!

From the Pulpit **CONTEMPLATIVE SERVICES OFFERED** IN MIDDLEBURY

During this Lenten season we often name things to give up, like a favorite food or activity. Another ritual of the season is to examine ourselves, our lives, and take stock of how we are faring in our spiritual life. This season of reflection is in preparation for the Easter season, when we celebrate our Risen Savior, Jesus Christ, and His faithful sacrifice on our behalf. Considering His willingness to follow the Father even to death, it is fitting for us to review how we've done in our efforts at faithful discipleship. Does our life identify us as followers of Jesus, or are we sucked in by the glitz and smooth talk of this world?

One way to enter into the season is to attend contemplative worship services with other Christians. This very widely recognized and practiced form of worship is often referred to as a "Taize" service, so named after the services held at the religious community of the same name in France. Established during WW II to aid war victims, over the years the Taize Community became a refuge for and ministry to the poor around the world. As stated on

their website (www.taize.fr/en

) "Today, the Taize Community is made up of over a hundred brothers, Catholics and from various Protestant backgrounds, coming from around thirty nations. By its very existence, the community is a "parable of community" that wants its life to be a sign of reconciliation between divided Christians and between separated peoples. . . Certain brothers live in some

of the disadvantaged places in the world, . . . (and) share the living conditions of the people around them. They strive to be a presence of love among the very poor, street children, prisoners, the dying, and those who are wounded by broken relationships, or who have been aban-

Over the years, Taize has become a popular destination for young adults and church leaders from around the globe. The distinctive contemplative worship style has spawned many followers on every continent, who regularly hold services and sing the music written in the community.

Several Christians in the Middlebury area have joined together to offer contemplative worship services, styled after the Taize services, at the for-

mer Pleasant Oaks Mennonite Church building, across from Das Essenhaus Inn. The worship is currently held each Tuesday evening at 7:00 PM. Everyone is welcome to participate.

Contemplative worship consists of reading scripture, prayer, and singing simple worship songs, some of which appear in many Hymnals. This worship can be described as thoughtful and meditative. A significant amount of time is spent in silence, reflecting on the scripture as we seek the presence of God. Prayers are offered, with opportunity for persons to offer their own spoken sentence prayers, or quiet prayers.

This is not an attempt to start another church, but simply to offer an opportunity to worship, across social, denominational or ethnic lines, to anyone who attends, whether a regular church attender or not. The organizers and attenders are members of several churches in the Middlebury area. If you are interested please come and join us next Tuesday. 
Having commented about the storm and the behavior of the plane, he asked why she had not been afraid. The child replied, "Cause my Daddy's the pilot, and he's taking me home."

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

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
