

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
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Definition of Foundation:



there's plenty of time for napping on the weekends if I would just structure my weekends to accommodate them, right??? Oh my ...





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












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From our Kitchen

HOT APPLE CIDER

INGREDIENTS:

- 6 cups apple cider
- 1/4 cup real maple syrup
- 2 cinnamon sticks
- 6 whole cloves
- 6 whole allspice berries
- 1 orange peel, cut into strips
- 1 lemon peel, cut into strips

DIRECTIONS: Pour the apple cider and maple syrup into a large stainless steel saucepan. Place the cinnamon sticks, cloves, allspice berries, orange peel and lemon peel in the center of a washed square of cheesecloth; fold up the sides of the cheesecloth to enclose the bundle, then tie it up with a length of kitchen string. Drop the spice bundle into the cider mixture. Place the saucepan over moderate heat for 5 to 10 minutes, or until the cider is very hot but not boiling. Remove the cider from the heat. Discard the spice bundle. Ladle the cider into big cups or mugs, adding a fresh cinnamon stick to each serving if desired.



PULLED PORK

Ingredients:

- 4 lb pork roast 2 onions, sliced, divided
- 1 onion, chopped

5 or 6 whole cloves 2 cups water 16 oz bottle of your favorite BBQ sauce salt and pepper

Preparation: Place one sliced onion at the bottom of Crock Pot. Stud pork roast with cloves and season with salt and



pepper. Place roast in slow cooker on top of the sliced onion. Cover with the second sliced onion and add enough water to fill Crock Pot two thirds of the way. Cover and cook on low 8 to 12 hours. Remove roast. Remove and discard cloves, bone and fat as well as any water, onions and grease remaining in pot. When pork roast is cool enough to handle, use a fork or your fingers to pull it apart until the entire roast is shredded. Return the pulled pork to the crock pot. Mix in the chopped onion and BBQ sauce and cover. Heat on high for 1-3 hours or until the onions are soft. Serve on large, crusty buns with a mustard based Carolina-style BBQ sauce. Garnish with dill pickle spears, thinly sliced raw onion and pickled pepperoncini (Italian banana peppers). Serve with crisp, homemade Cole slaw. Carolinians would put the Cole slaw on the pulled pork sandwiches...that's up to you.




