Words that spew off of the tongue in a hurried, angry rush are almost always regretted. When my children were young I would often wonder what they thought about the example I set. to offer encouragement from my teachings? Even when I scolded or disciplined them ... did the words seem harsh and stay on target (deed vs. consequence) or did they seem hurtful and careless? All of us have spoken words that we wished we could take back. Careless words spoken are a hard "wrong" to "right". Words reflect what is on our minds and in our heart. I hope my words encourage, build up, offer hope and give the people around me a bit of joy. My 5th grade teacher, Mrs. Walker, often encouraged us to "think before we speak". It has served me well over the years and I can tell you this ... the times I didn't take time to consider my words I have almost always regretted.



I love everything about October. I love the crispy crunch of the maroon and orange and golden leaves beneath my feet. I love when it's just cold enough in the morning to have a tiny bit of frost and I have to wear gloves and a hoodie on my way to work, but it's just warm enough in the afternoon that I can rake and burn the leaves without having to bundle up. This time of year is so evocative of nostalgic moments in my life, but the majority begin and end with carving pumpkins.

Few things in life bring me as much joy as sitting on the ground amidst a sea of newspapers strewn about with a knife and a huge spoon. I don't possess the artistic talents that my mom and my sister have, nor the ability to sculpt things like my middle son, so I never attempt to draw or paint or mold things. However, when it comes to carving, regardless of the outcome, I throw myself into the process wholeheartedly.

When I was thirteen, I put down my usual carving knife in order to try one of my dad's fish filleting knives. I had a knobby, oblong pumpkin that was screaming at me to carve the most perfectly narrowed eyes. I placed my left hand on the side of the pumpkin to keep it steady and ignored my mom's usual warnings to be careful (since she'd been telling me that every October for the last near-decade). I knew exactly what I was doing. I punctured the orange flesh slightly left of center, knife slicing up and to the left as through butter, drew it to the correct place and then, accidentally, about another inch further – an inch which led the knife directly through my left hand. Unbelievable, I thought. Apparently when she said 'be careful' each year, my mom actually had a reason. After

an hour or so in the emergency room and a few stitches, I was ready to go back home, somewhat more humble, but also pretty certain I could finish the perfectly narrowed eyes if only I'd be allowed to get that knife back in my hands. My attempts were quickly shut down.

This did not quell my desires. Over the years, I've tried using kits to create full scenes on pumpkins, carved words, lit candle after candle when they inevitably burn out, and even made perfectly narrowed eyes (avoiding, of course, the cursed filleting knife). There's something cathartic about it that I've never quite been able to put my finger on until recently when I read a story that gave me a new perspective and fueled my desire to carve even more.

The story said that the process of carving a pumpkin is something akin to what God does to our own lives. He takes something plain and ordinary, removes all the junk inside, turns us into a work of art, and places a light within us to shine for all to see. With this view, how could I not want to keep up with this ritual, one of my first loves?

My "Journey of Reinvention" is a constant, personal process of allowing God to do this within me. I am more than ready to have all of the junk inside of me removed! Sometimes I make mistakes because I am not paying attention to the warning signs along the way, thinking I know best. Sometimes the candle goes out because I'm smothering it with my own agenda. But I know that, in the end, He will make me His masterpiece and I'll feel His light inside of me, shining for the world to see.

A word from Bob Dwyer, Jr.



I hear this all the time, why, I even had a customer tell me the other day that my company was ripping people off because we offer an \$89.00 furnace check. It just so happens she was shopping for a new furnace and was getting estimates from a few heating companies. She called us because she wanted to see for herself how we were going to answer to the accusation. One of the contractors pointed out to her how we at A Good Neighbor Heating are ripping people off because we advertise furnace checks and not furnace cleanings, he explained to her how it's \$89.00 just to look at the furnace and not clean or do anything else to it ... what a rip off ... right?

I was very happy this lady took the time to call us to her home for a free estimate and I was happy she asked me about the misleading ad. This made me realize a lot of consumers just don't understand. How will the average person compare the terminology when it is blazingly apparent that some contractors don't even understand it all? Allow me to interject my 3rd generation Heating & Cool-

ing expertise here and break it down for you. Furnace checks, furnace cleanings, 21 point furnace tune ups, clean and checks ... these are all different terms used to describe a service and they certainly can mean different things. How do you really know what you're getting for your money and do you really get what you're paying for?

Let me share with you what I told the nice lady and her husband about the \$89.00 furnace check ... The reason we advertise furnace checks and not cleanings is because we want to give people the most for their money. The biggest concern for us is this ... is your furnace safe? For the \$89.00 sale price I send a certified experienced technician to your home (no extra trip, service or labor charges). He checks your electrical connections looking for loose or burnt wiring. He takes measurements of voltage and amperage. He checks for gas leaks and checks gas pressure for proper operation and safety from fire or explosions. He checks the condition of the furnace heat exchanger for damage or cracking. Now please pay special attention here because this is one of the things that separates our company from almost every other company ... this exam is done with a very special infrared camera designed specifically for this reason only; it has a large screen that you, the

customer, can see while the technician is doing the inspection. These cameras are so strong they can even detect hairpin cracks. This procedure erases all doubt ... there is no question if there is damage to one or more of the chambers of your heat exchanger or not. These are results that can only be achieved with the type of camera we use. Think of it as a scope ... with a normal camera (the type you and I use to record special family events) you may be able to see the outside front, top or side of the heat exchanger but with a scope you can now snake that camera all around the heat exchanger as well as down into each chamber. This is the same infrared camera that the military uses to inspect aircraft for defects and weak spots in the metal. Most companies do not invest in these cameras because they feel they are cost prohibitive. We feel that we owe it to our customers to use it ... what price can you place on someone's life? NATURAL CLEANING PRODUCTS

By making and using natural cleaning products it reduces the chemicals used in your household. Here are some natural cleaning products you make with either white vinegar or baking soda.

WHITE VINEGAR

White vinegar is a great natural disinfectant that removes mineral deposits and stains and does many other cleaning jobs.

• Vinegar and salt mixed together makes a great surface cleaner.

• Depending on how dirty your ceramic tile floor is, mix either a quarter or half cup of white vinegar into a gallon of warm water. This not only removes the dirt without having to scrub but there is no film left on the tiles.

• Apply warm vinegar to a cloth and squeeze the liquid onto stick-on hooks or bathtub no-slip decals to remove them.

• Mix a cup of vinegar into a gallon of warm water to remove grease and dull film from no-wax linoleum floors.

• Equal amounts of vinegar and water remove carpet stains, pet smells and clean ovens.

• To clean stone and brick floors, mix a cup of white vinegar into a gallon of warm water. Scrub the floor and then rinse it with clean water.

• To clean a dirty flower vase, add one or two tablespoons of vinegar and fill the base with warm water. Let this soak for half an hour and scrub with a soft cloth. Rinse and then dry and your flower vase will be clean and smell great.

• Into a spray bottle add one-quarter cup of vinegar and fill with water. Spray on windows or glass and use either paper towels or crumpled newspaper to dry and shine.

• On a damp cloth, sprinkle baking soda and then rub on your silverware to remove tarnish. Once you remove the tarnish, rinse and then dry.

BAKING SODA

•You can make a general cleaner by getting a quart of warm water and dissolving four tablespoons of baking soda into this.

• Make a paste using baking soda with a little water and rub on black heel marks to remove these from your floor.

• To deodorize and clean all your bathroom and kitchen surfaces, use baking soda on a clean, damp sponge.

• One half cup of baking soda added to the wash makes clothes and towels smell fresh and feel soft.



INGREDIENTS:

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 (29 ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 (29 ounce) can diced tomatoes
- 2 cubes beef bouillon cube

- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 2 cups cooked white rice

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a Dutch oven brown beef over medium high heat. Drain off any fat.
- 2. Add the peppers to the browned meat and saute for 3 minutes.
- 3. Stir in the tomato sauce, diced tomatoes with juice, bouillon cubes, brown sugar, salt, pepper and soy sauce. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer for 30 to 15 minutes. Stir in rise and heat through



TALK ACROSS THE FENCE AUTUMN DOOR **DUST BUNNIES** HANGER

She cleans regularly and I know for a fact that she is fairly thorough in her routine. (Not OCD ... more of a perfectionist). She claimed that it was always disconcerting and just a tad disheartening to find another family of dust bunnies hiding behind a TV or a refrigerator. They have a beautiful home that always smells so good and

presents like something out of a magazine. They have no pets in the home to add to the bunny situation but apparently the little bit of carpet and fibers in the home did just fine on their own. The only remedy I could offer was for them to think about purchasing a filtration system (which we just happen to have in stock here at the shop). You see, our home is a log home and even with three dogs and a bird we rarely get a visit from Peter Dustytail (Peter Cottontail's distant cousin) because of the air filtration systems we have in place. Good air filtration doesn't give dust much of a chance to collect, let alone give birth. Well, after talking to my son, they didn't hesitate and

had the system installed and are now living in a bunny-free environment. It's a good thing

... at last count before the installation Gigi had counted 38 bunnies in all (and some looked suspiciously big in the belly) ... she was horrified thinking she might have to name them all and adopt them as pets. Ha ha. (Family humor!) ((Sorry.)) In conclusion, yes, dust bunnies do exist and are known to multiply rapidly and yet they can be evicted from the home never to return. Now that's good news! Oh ... did you know that even the tiniest of dust bunnies are known allergens ... shame on them!



WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

• 1 large piece of art paper or 2 sheets of white construction paper Acrylic craft paint in fall colors such as red, orange, brown, yellow, gold and green • Scissors

- 15" twig or branch
- 4- 15" lengths of jewelry cord
- White craft glue
- Football-shaped cookie cutter (optional)

HOW TO MAKE IT:

1. Using a paper plate or paint palette, squeeze out about a quartersize dollop of each color of paint.

2. Finger paint the entire piece of art paper with the different colors. Let children be creative, just guide them if they start to blend colors too much as you can end up with a brownish gray color. Let the paint dry completely.

3. When the paint has dried, turn the paper over and do the same thing on the other side. Let dry.

4. When paint has dried, use a football-shaped cookie cutter to draw out as many shapes as you can on the painted paper. If you don't have a cookie cutter, draw out simple leaf shapes.

5. Cut out the leaf shapes and set the scraps aside to use for another project.

6. Set a bug-free branch on the work surface. (See the tips section for methods of ridding branches from bugs.) Line up three pieces of the jewelry cord, evenly spaced from each other, along the stick. 7. Glue the leaves onto the cord, placing one under the cord, and then overlapping a second leaf over the first leaf and the cord. Repeat until all three cords have leaves.

8. Tie the top end of the cords to the stick. Secure with some white craft glue.

9. Tie the remaining piece of jewelry cord to both ends of the stick to create the hanger. Secure knots with some glue. Let glue dry. 10. Trim the excess cord ends.

INGREDIENTS:

- 3/4 cup light corn syrup
- 1/4 cup margarine
- 2 teaspoons cold water

- 2 5/8 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 cup marshmallows
- 5 quarts plain popped popcorn
